Columbus shocked 5-4 by Ankeny in tourney; Warriors romp 10-1

A third match between the Waterloo public school Warriors and the Columbus of Waterloo Sailors melted away in the last 14 seconds of a second round game Friday night in the state high school hockey tournament at McElroy Auditorium.

An aroused Ankeny team, beaten twice this season by the Sailors, never trailed Friday, but it took Ted Wiles' fourth goal of the game to give the Hawks a \$4 upset victory over the lowa High School Hockey League champion Sailors.

So instead of a possible title game Sunday against the Warriors, Columbus will play Sloux City at 1 p.m. Sunday for fifth place, their lowest finish ever in the state meet.

PUBLIC COACH Dave Swick, whose Warriors defeated Sioux City 10-1 in the final of four games Friday, said, "I hated to see Columbus get beat. It would have been good for the tournament to see us meet again."

Swick's club had an individual performance that topped Wiles', however, as Mike Lamb scored five goals, the first

Columbus battled back twice from twogoal deficits and there were two benchclearing celebrations in the final 77 seconds of the game.

Steve McIntee hit a driving 15-footer for the Sailors to tie the score 44 with 1:17 left, but the Sailors never raillied after the face off and 63 seconds later Wiles drilled a shot high into the net, also from about 15 feet

"They were the only team we hadn't beaten before this season," said Coach Ray Mikulan. "We were really up for this one. The kids on the bench kept our skaters pumped up.

"Wiles played a good game and (Doran) Doty was fantastic. Kurt Anderson played exceptionally well in the goal too."

Columbus outshot Ankeny 33-23.

"We just didn't play well," said Sailor Coach Duke Dutkowski, whose team defeated Ankeny twice by 9-1 scores enroute to the regular season championship. "They came to play and they beat us.

"Wiles is a good hockey player-probably the best in the league."

Then the Sialors started their comeback on a power play goal with 11:10 left when Wiles was serving his fourth penalty.

COLUMBUS TRAILED 2-0 early, tied it 2-2 on the first goal of the second period and then fell behind again 4-2.

The final game was just the opposite the most one-sided game of the tournament. "I thought Sioux City played a heck of a game last (Thursday) night," Swick said. "I was worried."

Two goals in the first 1:19 helped relieve Swick's worries. Sioux City didn't get a shot on goal for eight minutes in the first period.

However, the Metros cut the Warriors' lead to 4-1 when Paul Kambackph hit from the blue line with 8:26 gone in the second period and, at that time, the Warriors hadn't had a shot in the period.

Waterloo hit its next two shots—both by Lamb—and got only its third shot of the period with one second left.

Lamb's third straight goal made the score 8-1 Waterloo 50 seconds into the final period, and the Warriors' third win over the Metros was secure.

The paid attendance for the two sessions Friday totaled 1,885. In afternoon second round matches Urbandale nipped Mason City 6-4, while Valley of West Des Moines scored the third shutout of the tournament, winning 8-0 over Ames.
