Sailor skaters after 2nd state title in row

Five out of seven and two straight—that's what Columbus of Waterloo has going for it when it opens defense of its back-toback Iowa High School Hockey League championships this season.

The Sailors have won the state high school championship five out of the seven times it has been held, including the past two years and, while it appears chances are good the trophy will remain in Waterloo, it may not necessarily rest in the Sailors' hands.

Columbus opens its season Nov. 19 against Lourdes in a non-league game and doesn't swing into IHSHL action until Nov. 26 when the Sailors host Dowling of West Des Moines.

TEN PLAYERS are gone from last year's championship team, including goaltender Scott Boice, while 12 return, including all-staters Mark Lanigan and Scott Dolan. Lanigan is a four-time first team all-stater while Dolan has received that honor three times. He was selected to the second team another year when he was injured for part of the season.

Rob Leskun, also a returnee from last season, is out with torn knee ligaments and won't see any action for at least two or hree weeks.

Public, with eight returning seniors, will offer a stiff challenge to the Sailors.

Swick, in his sixth year with the Warriors, had some 40 players trying out for the team, but can dress only 20 on the varsity roster. The others will play on a junior varsity team.

Public opens its season Friday, Nov. 12 when it entertains Hoover-Roosevelt at McElroy Auditorium. The Warriors have one state championship to credit and finished second to Dowling the only other year Columbus didn't win the title.

The Warriors finished 10-6 in league play and fourth in the state tourney last spring. The Sailors went 15-1 during the regular season and capped it all with a 6-4 come-frombehind win over Valley of West Des Moines in the title game.
