# Warriors take 8-2 route to finals

MASON CITY—It'll be all-Waterloo in the 1983 championship game of the Iowa Hockey League state tournament.

That situation evolved Sunday as Columbus and Waterloo's Warriors each settled scores of sorts with semifinal wins. The Sailors downed Des Moines

Public 8-4 in the evening after losing and tying in two previous tries against Public this season.

The Warriors, meanwhile, whipped Valley of West Des Moines 8-2. Valley was the only team to defeat the Warriors during the regular league season and also knocked them into the consolation bracket in the 1982 state tourney.

Consequently, the Sailors and Warriors square off at 6 p.m. Sunday in the new North Iowa Recreational Arena here.

All fans coming to Sunday's game are encouraged to park at the North Iowa Medical Center, where there will be a shuttle bus to the arena.

The Warriors took another step toward adding their second state title to

the regular season league championship they won on the strength of Jim Hayes' three goals and two apiece from Brian Cook and Mark Stevens.

Waterloo's first goal came while the Warriors were skating short-handed. The play began when a Valley player fired a shot which hit both posts and bounced out. The goal judge inadvertently lit the red light and the Valley players raised their sticks in celebration.

The celebration, however, was premature, as the referee waved the goal off.

Jim Tyler grabbed the puck during the confusion and quickly passed to Cook who skated up the right side of the ice, faked a shot and scored as he cut in front of the goalie at 4:37 of the period.

According to Coach Dave Swick the play was a key to the game. "They hit the post, raised their arms and we went down and scored."

The next Warriors goal came after Doug Dietz recovered the puck behind

through two. Scott Dolan fired in four of the third period goals.

Des Moines had taken a 1-0 lead at 7:41 of the opening period and at 8:29, Des Moines again scored when Jim Webb shot the puck past Quincy McGrane.

Columbus tied the game at 2-2 as Lanigan scored from the left side of the face-off circle.

Then Des Moines took a 3-2 lead when Tony Penniman scored an advantage goal at 4:19.

Columbus turned what could have been a disastrous situation into one of glory with 5 minutes left in the second period when, with Tim Martin in the penalty box for elbowing, McGrane was penalized for high sticking and Columbus was forced to skate two men short.

Lanigan stole the puck, skated down alone on the Des Moines net and knotted the score at three.
