Jim Tyler grabbed the puck during the confusion and quickly passed to Cook who skated up the right side of the icè, faked a shot and scored as he cut in front of the goalie at 4:37 of the period.

According to Coach Dave Swick the play was a key to the game. "They hit the post, raised their arms and we went down and scored.'
