Columbus skaters under new coach Jimmy Smith

For only the second time in the history of the Iowa state high school hockey tournament, the championship trophy does not belong to one of Waterloo's two teams.

In fact, for the first time in history, Waterloo did not have a representative in the finals where Des Moines Public defeated Urbandale last winter for the state title.

Since the state tournament began in 1976, Columbus of Waterloo won titles in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1991 and 1962. Waterloo's Warriors captured the championship in 1980 and 1963. Now, the task at hand is for one of the teams to return it to Waterloo.

Both Columbus and the Warriors head into the 1984-85 - season with a stable of returning talent. Columbus returns 17 letterwinners from last year's team that finished 8-13 overall and 6-10 in the Iowa High School Hockey League.

Included are brothers Joel and Jon Jasper, both named all-state honorable mention a year ago. Joel is the top returning scorer while Jon anchors the defense for the Sailors.

The Sailors will also have a new coach at the helm in Jim Smith, a former Waterloo Black Hawks player. He'll be assisted by Mike Brown, who has served as cocoachof the Black Hawks' United States Hockey Leëgue team in the past. Comparatively, Smith B

will have fewer players to work with than his Warriors counterpart, Dave Swick. Of Smith's 25 players, however, 17 are lettermen.

The Sailors would appear to be sound delensively with junior Jon Jasper and senior Jeff Rink leading the way. And, goaltenders Pat Lanigan and Chris Taylor, who split time in the nets last season, both return. Lanigan will be a sophomore and Taylor is now a junior.

In all, just seven of the Sailors are seniors—Joel Jasper, Rink, Tony Fischer, Tom Lanigan, Mike McGarvey, Tom Sinnott and Dennis Fry.

The Warriors, meanwhile, have 32 players on the varsity roster and eight of their top 11 scorers from last season back among at least 13 players returning who saw regular action. The leading returning scorer is senior Brian Cook (25 goals, 26 assist), a firstteam all-stater in 1983-84. Other players back include Eric Runge (28 points), Brian Carnes (24 points), T.J. Saul (22 points), T.J. Saul (22 points), Tim Bartz (21 points), Rob Brown (15 points), Dan Michelsen (14 points), Brown was an honorable mention choice for the all-state team.

The Warriors biggest problem, it would seem, is to find a goaltender to fill the shoes of Brad Nielsen and Paul Nelson, who plaved their last season.

Columbus opens its IHSHL season Nov. 16 at Valley-Dowling while the Warriors begin league play the same evening in Mason City.

The HISHL will be a seven-team league this season. Dubuque has dropped its high school hockey program and Des Moines Public, the 1983-84 state champion, has combined with runnerup Urbandale.
