First hockey all-star game a success

MASON CITY - For a rare couple of hours Tuesday night, Iowa's finest high school hockey players found themselves making passes to one another rather than taking them away.

The occasion was the first Iowa High School Hockey League all-star game here at the North Iowa Recreational Arena and 30 of the state's top players put on a dazzling show.

It was fast-paced, penalty-free hockey that featured stellar goaltending and, particularly for the White team, hard-nosed defense. The White also had more offensive punch and won the game, 4-1.

Each member of the league was allowed two automatic choices and was then asked to select 10 additional players. The remainder of the spots were then chosen by ballot after the original submissions. The teams were divided in an attempt to provide as even a match as possible.

Brian Carnes, one of five Waterloo Warriors named to the team, opened the scoring fpor the White team 1:48 into the game with the only goal against Urbandale's Matt Haws, who finished with 17 saves in 22 minutes of play.

The Green team knotted the game with :51 to play in the second period before the White, with the IHSHL's top-scoring line featuring Scot Johnston, Bill Norris and John Newell of Ames, had a hand in three goals over the final 15 minutes to sew up the victory.

Taylor finished with eight saves in nine shots as the White allowed the Green only 13 shots on net and Dolan was making his first game appearance since suffering a knee injury a couple of weeks ago.
