## Warriors set to begin defense of state hockey title Thursday

AMES — Waterloo's Warriors begin defense of their state high school hockey championship here Thursday and the Warriors know there will be nothing easy about repeating.

Most likely, they will have to go through three teams that finished ahead of them during the regular season to win back-to-back titles, beginning at 3 p.m. Thursday against the 18-8 Omaha Gladiators.

Ironically, it was a first-round win over the Gladiators last year that sent Waterloo on its way to the championship after the Warriors had failed to defeat Omaha during the regular Iowa High School Hockey League season.

This year, Waterloo lost to the Gladiators 4–3 in overtime and 9-3. Omaha features a potent offense that led the league in short-handed scores with 20 while averaging 6.3 goals per game. Ted Lowndes finished as the league scoring champion with 86 points in 26 games, an average of 3.31. Teammate Dusty Stolp was right behind at 3.19 points per game.

"That's their big punch," says Warriors Coach Dave Swick. "If we can keep them off the board, we've got a good shot at them."

If Waterloo can topple Omaha, it wouldn't play again until 7:30 p.m. Saturday in the semifinals where the opponent is expected to be overall learne chara Dubugue, which went 22:3.1

City and Valley-Dowling.

As a group, those top four seeds were responsible for all of the Warriors' losses this season, although Waterloo tied Dubuque once and lost one-goal games to each of the others.

"If we happen to go all the way, we're going to have three tough

games," says Swick.

"But honestly, last year I thought our chances were slimmer than this year. I think we've got enough talent to win. I don't know that there's anybody we couldn't beat. Last year I don't think I could have said that."

Omaha Coach Tim Lowndes, who plans to step down after one season with the varsity, is the older brother of the league scoring champ. He expects a battle from the Warriors.

"They played us pretty tough that one game," he said. "Our clock reads tenths of a second and I think there was less than a full second left when we beat them."

Overall, Swick rates Dubuque as the team to beat while Lowndes likes Sioux City. "Dubuque was not real impressive, but they sure won a lot of games," Swick says. Included were seven one-goal wins and another by two goals.

Sioux City dominated the league's team offensive statistics, but the Metros rang up 17-1, 16-1, 23-0 and 20-1 routs of the winless Omaha Junior Lancers.

"They're just big, hard hitters," says Lowndes. "They don't have anybody that totally stands out, but a lot of guys contribute and they move the puck really well."

In the final analysis, Swick says his team's fortunes will boil down to capitalizing on its scoring chances and how well it plays behind its own blue line. Last year, goaltender K.C. Doland had a sensational tournament.

Should Waterloo drop its opener Thursday, the Warriors would move into the consolation bracket for a 3:30 p.m. game Friday.
