# Metros rally, reach finals

## Sioux City, Mason City clash for title **By Terry Hersom**

Journal sports editor It wasn't "just before the dawn."

Not anywhere close. However, midway through the afternoon Saturday, it was darkest, indeed, for the Sioux City Metros, regular-season champions of the Iowa High School Hockey League and defending champs in the IHSHL's annual post-season tournament

On Friday, the Metros had lost two-thirds of their heavy artillery when right winger Jesper Kilander suffered a season-ending injury and center Jesse Monell drew a game misconduct penalty, disqualifying him from the rest of the tournament at Sioux City Auditorium.

On Saturday, sorely missing the offensive punch these players might have provided, the Metros trailed 3-1 with less than three minutes to play against Ames, a team they'd beaten 9-6 and 16-5 during the regular season.

Ames, a Cinderella team that escaped the opening round with a double-overtime upset win over fourth-seeded West Des Moines Valley-Dowling, was on the verge of dethroning the IHSHL tourney's defending champion. NOT.

Along came Daniel Davies, racing away from a defender for a breakaway wrist shot, cutting the Ames lead to 3-2 with just 2:18 remaining in the tournament semifinal. Then, just seconds later, there was Davies again, sliding a perfect pass to teammate Landon Blatchford, who flipped home a tying goal with exactly 2:00 on the clock

Finally, defenseman Karri Poykio, a Heelan High exchange student from Finland, contributed his third assist of the day, feeding West High junior Eric Rubel for the game win-ner at 7:22 of a sudden-death overtime

The dramatic 4-3 triumph, Sioux City's 15th in a row, sends the Metros into today's 3 p.m. championship game against third-seeded Mason City, which improved to 18-6-0 with a 6-3 win over the secondseeded Omaha Gladiators. The Gladiators, 19-7-0, face

Ames, 12-11-1, in the third-place game at noon. For quite some time Saturday,
