☐ Lloyd set to retire after 18 seasons as coach of the Mohawk Hockey Club.

John Lloyd and hockey go way back.

For the past 32 years, the Mason City Hockey Club coach has coached numerous teams of nany different age groups.

He has spent the past 18 sea
ons as coach of the Mohawks.

But Sunday's state tourna-ent game at the North Iowa Ice Arena will mark the last time Lloyd coaches from behind the Mohawks' bench.

After last season, on March 14, Lloyd announced he is retiring at the conclusion of the

"Sometimes I don't even think about it." he said. "But sometimes I'm up late by myself and I start thinking about the things I'm going to miss. There are a lot of friends in and around the league — other coaches, I'll miss seeing

There are a couple of arena that I won't miss going to at all. But it's going to be different and I might find myself not knowing what to do with all my

was an air traffic controller. One evening, he walked to an or rink near his residence



could and I took over the team.
"It turned out to be a pretty od team and we won the city championship that year. And that's how I got started," he

Lloyd coached 12 years in Anchorage, moving up to an assistant coach at the high school level

From there he transferred as an air traffic controller to

Farmington, Minn.
"I coached the Pee Wee team for two years and the high school asked me to come in and be an assistant there," Lloyd said. "I took that job for two

"I think I really would like to work with youth players," he said. "Maybe not as a coach, but just helping out."

Lloyd, the arena manager who spends much of his time there, said he needs to spend more time at the arena and it has kept him busier this year

"I would push for us to have nother facility so that we have that extra ice sheet that we definitely need." he said "Hopefully it would be open part of the summer. It would end up becoming a full-time job in the summer also, but it's omething that we could use

from 1985-93. He was general manager of the North Iowa Huskies from 1984-88.

After all the years and the hard work Hanna put into the Mason City hockey programs, it's the kids that he'll miss the most.

The fun part of the whole thing is the kids," he said. "Every one of them is unique. They're all learning and they're all growing up. Over the years we've had a bunch of great kids come through here.
