

MASON CITY - John Lloyd feels it's just the right

The Mason City Hockey Club coach will stand behind the Mohawk bench for just one more season before he steps down as coach.

"It's time," Lloyd said, "I've got grandkids that are playing up in Minnesota that I want to watch. I don't get much of a chance to see them. I'd also like to spend more time with my wife. Things like that."

It will be his 18th year as coach of the Mohawks and 30th year overall.
