The Capitals defeated Mason City, 6-3, in the Iowa

Sunday afternoon at the ice arena in Urbandale to win the city of Des Moines' first state trophy since 2000.

"These are the best three games I've played in my life," Krohn said. "I went over the top this weekend. It's nice to know I helped the team win.'

Krohn, who attends Roosevelt, had eight points in 27 regular-season games. He finished the Capitals' three-game tournament run

state championship game with four points - on three goals and one assist. "His play has been fan-

tastic," Capitals coach Scott Krueger said. "A senior going out that way is great. The Capitals also finished

on top as a team. They won the regularseason title and entered the

state tournament, which they hosted, as the top seed. The Capitals won 23 of their final 24 games.

"It's unreal," Capitals forward Brad Krueger said.

Krueger scored what ended up as the gamewinning goal 15 seconds into the third period.

As the final seconds ticked off the scoreboard clock.

saves Sunday, allowed five goals in three tournament games. The Capitals finished the regular

season with the fewest goals allowed in the league. Sunday's championship oppo-

nent, Mason City, had two of the league's top-five goaltenders in Tyler Brown and Brent Frein, and the league's points leader in Cole

The Capitals, who beat Mason City three times during the regular season, shut down the Mohawks for two periods Sunday and took a 4-0 lead with Krueger's goal.

Capitals junior forward Brett Ferguson put Des Moines' first point on the board with nine seconds left in the first period with a power-play goal.

Ferguson skated around the back of the net and got the puck to ricochet off Mason City goaltender Brown and into the net.

"He's good behind the net with the puck," Capitals coach Scott Krueger said.

Derek Elliott, Krohn and Brad Krueger bumped the score to 4-0 before Mike Murtaugh scored Mason City's first goal 6:01 into the

third period on a power play. Krohn regained a four-goal lead, but then the Capitals got into penalty trouble, giving the Mohawks a 5-on-3 skater advantage. The Mohawks scored on both power plays to cut Des Moines' lead to two goals with 3:03 left in the game.

"The game kind of got away from us," Brad Krueger said.

Tim Ramsey's empty net goal in the final minute sealed the win for the Capitals.

"We had a slow start this season and are on fire now." Brad Krueger Capitals defenseman Roch Naert

was named the tournament's most valuable player. The Urbandale senior helped the Capitals finish the season with a 28-5-0 record. Mason City closed the season

with a 24-6-1 record.
