■ Waterloo works OT again, but comes up shy in fifth-place contest

URBANDAILE — Sunday, the Waterloo Warriors' endured a bitter, 2-1 setback in a shootout with Kansas City to conclude their season in the fifth-place game of the Midwest High School Hockey League's state

tournament.

Bryn Klein's first-period, power-play goal ended up sending the game to an extra frame, where Kansas City promptly outscored the Warriors, 3-1. The extra session served as a rare blemish on Waterloo net-minder Jared Weber's otherwise sterling night; Weber recorded 30 saves, all told.

With the loss, Waterloo closed its campaign with a 19-10-2-2 overall record, with 42 total

points. The Warriors ended in a tie for fourth place in the league standings. Kansas City finished with a mark of 18-10-4-1.

Later Sunday, the Des Moines Oak Leafs trumped Omaha, 2-1, to claim the league title. Des Moines' Troy DuBay was named tournament's MVP.
